Special thanks to Lynnette, as well as to our incoming MAL, Karl Swinehart, who was elected to fill this critical role.

In other news, we owe gratitude to Sandhya Narayanan, who is rotating off an extended term as Program Chair and is passing the reins to Andrew Carruthers. Elaine Chun will join the Nominations Committee as its newest member, alongside Britta Ingebretson (Chair) and Chip Zuckerman. Thanks also to Jocelyn Ahlers for her service. Courtney Handman will replace Michael Wroblewski as *Anthropology News* co-editor. 1. Imagination, Creation, Critique: 3rd Biennial SLA Conference Updates

The 3rd Biennial SLA Conference—IMAGINATION, CREATION, CRITIQUE— will take place in Chicago from May 29 to May 31, 2025. Please note that submissions are due soon: December 20, 2024. WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO IMAGINE TODAY?

The 2025 Society for Linguistic Anthropology Conference invites participants to explore the many ways that imagination critically shapes, reproduces, and transforms social worlds across times, spaces, and scales through discursive and non-discursive processes and practices. Starting with the idea of imagination as movement toward a thing, state of affairs, and/or set of ideas that does not (yet) exist, we prompt participants to ask: Who imagines? What gets imagined? Toward what ends and with what effects? How do particular imaginaries resist or engage practices and technologies of mediation? What happens when imagination is not just linked to, but is also untethered from temporal terms and logics? What is the relationship between imagination and forms of individual and collective action, including narrative, claims-making, and other rhetorical modes? How can we understand the myriad instantiations of imagination, creation, and critique—from innovation, construction, or invention to destruction, violence, or the reinforcement of the status quo?

CALL FOR PROPOSALS:

The conference will feature a variety of session formats, including:

- **Poster Plenary Presentations**: Highlight your research asynchronously and during a marquee plenary event.
- **Lightning Talk/Project Incubator**: Share emerging ideas or ongoing research in a concise 5-minute presentation.
- Individual Paper Presentations: Present a 15-minute talk as part of an assembled panel.
- Panels: Organized sessions with 4–6 papers, with or without a discussant.
- Community-Engaged Skills Labs: Interactive sessions to exchange tools, methods, and resources.
- Pedagogy/Professional Development Workshops: Hands-on sessions focused on teaching and professionalization strategies.
- Making and Doing Sessions: Collaborative, tangible, hands-on activities.

2. 2024 SLA Business Meeting Summary

What follows is a summary of the meeting minutes, prepared by Courtney Handman and Sarah Muir, for the SLA Business Meeting held virtually on November 15, 2024:

Opening Remarks

SLA President E. Summerson Carr initiated the Zoom meeting by reiterating the Board's decision to conduct official events online. This approach was designed to ensure accessibility for members not attending the AAA meeting in Tampa. The awards ceremony, which traditionally follows the business meeting, will take place at the SLA Conference in the Spring.

SLA Executive Board Updates

The SLA Executive Board highlighted its focus over the past year on three key areas:

- 1. Strengthening Organizational Infrastructure: Enhancing infrastructure through projects such as developing organizational archives and driving membership growth.
- **2. Improved Communication**: Introducing initiatives like a quarterly newsletter and the "SLA Futures" event.
- **3.** Responsiveness to Membership: Addressing members' needs, particularly in terms of accessibility and mentoring.

Committee Reports and Member Initiatives

- Language and Social Justice Committee: Nadxieli Toledo-Bustamante outlined ongoing efforts to refine accessibility practices and policies within the SLA.
- **Mentoring Initiatives**: On behalf of Jennifer Delfino, Steve Black discussed upcoming mentoring opportunities focusing on work-life balance for mid-career scholars, students, and early-career professionals.
- **Section Publications**: Michael Wroblewski reviewed recent contributions to *Anthropology News* and encouraged members to send submissions for the 2025 themes (migration, signal/noise, invisibility, fluidity) to Sarah Muir and Courtney Handman.
- **Digital Media Presence**: Shannon Ward described efforts to expand SLA's presence on its website and blog, while Nora Tyeklar outlined similar work across social media platforms (Facebook, X, LinkedIn, Instagram).

SLA Meeting Events at the AAAs

Program Chair Sandhya Narayanan summarized the SLA's activities at the Tampa meeting, which included: 15 panels; 3 roundtables; 6 poster presentations; 3 virtual individual talks; 2 flash presentations and 3 executive sessions. She noted that the number of events for the 2024 meeting represents approximately 50% of the 2023 total.

Virtual Programming and Accessibility Coordination

Virtual Program Chairs Rafadi Hakim and Andrew Graan introduced their new initiative and announced two upcoming virtual events: a discussion on the politics of free speech (January 24, 2025) and a professionalization and mentoring workshop (March or April 2025).

As the newly appointed Accessibility Coordinator, Steve Black invited members to share concerns, suggestions, and ideas, particularly in preparation for the Spring 2025 SLA Conference in Chicago.

Journal Updates

Journal Editor Anna Babel reported a significant increase in the *Journal of Linguistic* Anthropology impact factor (from 0.8 to 1.8). She emphasized efforts to enhance the journal's accessibility and relevance through:

- The inclusion of diverse genres,
- Thematic issues, and
- A revitalized social media strategy.

She highlighted the journal's efficient timeline of seven months from submission to acceptance and encouraged continued submissions and citations of recently published articles to boost visibility.

Nominations and Membership

- Elise Berman (AAA Nominations Committee) encouraged nominations and selfnominations for AAA positions.
- Jocelyn Ahlers (SLA Nominations Committee) invited nominations for SLA roles, including President Elect, Member-at-Large, and Nominations Committee positions.
- Joel Kuipers (AAA Executive Board) discussed declines in AAA membership and revenue, recent AAA office reorganization, and deliberations on how the association should address political issues, such as the issuing of statements.

2025 SLA Conference

Conference Chair Dominika Baran outlined the vision for the 2025 SLA Conference, focusing on interdisciplinary collaboration, innovation, shared labor, community building, and enjoyment. Program Chair Joshua Babcock introduced new submission formats, urging members to consider presenting their research in the planned poster plenary session. Logistics and Local Chair, Thea Strand, discussed accommodation options in conference-affiliated hotels and plans for a student housing cooperative.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Netta Avineri addressed a decline in section membership, which is tracking both with seasonal trends and with overall AAA membership numbers. She assured members that reduced costs have mitigated immediate financial concerns but noted the need for additional funds for next year's SLA conference and expanded accessibility initiatives.

Recognition and Announcements

Summerson Carr began by stressing the importance of membership renewal for the health and sustainability of the organization, and to support new initiatives. She also acknowledged the contributions of outgoing Extended Board members and urged members to participate actively in SLA initiatives, including, serving on the extended board, writing for *JLA* and *Anthropology News*, mentoring students and other junior members, and serving on prize committees.

The Language and Social Justice (LSJ) Committee is seeking two to three new members to join the core committee for an (almost) three-year term starting ASAP and ending in January 2028. The LSJ is a standing committee of the Society for Linguistic Anthropology dedicated to increasing awareness of and responding to language-related injustice. Core members organize the committee's efforts and serve three-year terms to ensure strong institutional memory within the group. New core committee members will become co-chairs in their third year (calendar year 2027).

There is no formal deadline, as positions will remain open until filled. In your statement of interest, please include the issues you are particularly passionate about and any experience you have in advocating for language-related justice.

We strongly encourage applications from historically marginalized and underrepresented groups, including (but not limited to) BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and other people of color) scholars, disabled scholars, queer and trans scholars, and scholars with diverse language backgrounds. Applicants at all career stages (including graduate students) and those with any or no institutional affiliation are welcome.

Submissions Open: 2023-2024 New Voices Book Prize

Submissions are now open for the 2023-2024 New Voices Book Prize. The SLA welcomes books with a conceptual and theoretical focus, as well as ethnographic and descriptive works. Single- or multi-author books—but not edited collections—are eligible. Books must be written in English and published between January 1, 2023, and December 31, 2024, to qualify for the 2024 award.

Eligibility and Submission Details:

A book may only be submitted in one biennial round of competition and cannot be entered into both the Sapir Prize and the New Voices Book Prize competitions. Authors must be SLA members at the time of submission.

Established in 2021, the New Voices Book Prize is a biennial award recognizing a book by a junior scholar (published within twelve years of earning the PhD) that makes a pathbreaking contribution to the field of linguistic anthropology.

The submission deadline is March 15, 2025.
